

CURRENT PICTURE

01 General Fund Deficit

If 2025 services and staffing are maintained in 2026, there would be a \$19M deficit in the General Fund.

02 Increased Expenses

2026 expenses in the preliminary budget, including salaries and benefits, operations, and goods and services, increased by 1.7% over the 2025 year end estimate.

03 Flat Revenues

Property tax revenue increased by 1% (plus new construction) in 2025, sales and use taxes increased by 4.2% over 2024.

04 Reduced Grant Support

Federal and state support has been reduced, particularly with the loss of ARPA, but there has additionally been increased mandated services without monetary support.



2026 REDUCTIONS

SENIOR MEAL PROGRAM TRANSITION

County Commissioners have requested Northwest Regional Council find a new provider for the senior meals program by July 1, 2026.

WORKFORCE REDUCTION

The County has proposed 28 position reductions in addition to eliminating 23 positions within the Public Health Department for transitioning the meal program starting July 1, 2026.

HIRING FREEZE & FURLOUGH DAYS

Temporary 90-day hiring freeze has been extended indefinitely to stabilize budgets, and there will be 10 county closure days in 2026.



WHERE DO OUR PROPERTY TAXES GO?




WHERE DO OUR PROPERTY TAXES GO?

WITHIN THE COUNTY, FOR EVERY \$1






SOURCES OF GENERAL FUND REVENUE

TYPES OF COUNTY FUNDS

49 TOTAL!

General Fund (1)

• Everything not accounted for in a different fund.

Special Revenue Funds (35)

- Restricted for a specific purpose other than debt or capital.
- Examples Public Health, County Roads, EMS, Elections, etc.

Debt Service Fund (1)

 Principal and interest payments on debt.

Capital Funds (5)

 Acquisition or construction of capital facilities or other assets.

Enterprise Funds (3)

 Activities for which a fee is charged to external users

Internal Service Funds (4)

- Provide service within our government, or to other governments, on a cost reimbursement basis.
- Examples Equipment Rental, Information Services, Insurance, etc.

Outstanding debt obligations on the following projects:







COMPETITIVE PAY & EQUITABLE HIRING


Continued evaluation of competitive pay and benefits, and adoption of job descriptions which provide alternatives for minimum requirements to include formal education, experience, certifications and/or licensing.

RECRUITMENT PROGRAM

Development of a recruitment program to expand our outreach to more qualified candidates.

EMPLOYEE WELLBEING & COLLABORATION

Employee satisfaction survey and policies which support work life balance and flexible work schedules. Ongoing support for county employee collaboration opportunities through the County Connects and all-staff summer appreciation event.



NEW COURTHOUSE PLANNING EFFORTS

Communications and outreach consultant work for a future new courthouse building and Sheriff headquarters.

JUVENILE DETENTION FEASIBILITY STUDY

Assess facility options and capacities of current Juvenile Detention programs.

RISK, SAFETY, SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS

Assessment of Continental Building for risk and safety, ADA corrections countywide, and improving the security posture of technology infrastructure.

DATA ACCURACY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Gegraphic Information Services mapping improvement efforts.



EXPAND CRISIS RESPONSE TEAM

Continue adding Crisis Response Team members until CRT is available countywide 24/7.

NEW RECOVERY & TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

Using behavioral health sales tax funding and opioid settlement dollars, expanding recovery housing and creating first transitional housing offering in Skagit County.

THERAPEUTIC COURT & RE-ENTRY SERVICES

Reduce recidivism by increasing therapeutic court participation and re-entry services for Community Justice Center.

IMPLEMENT CASE CONSULT MODEL

Working with Coordinated Entry partners to quickly identify and house the mose vulnerable households.



MOUNT VERNON SENIOR CENTER ASSESSMENT

Assessment of Mount Vernon Senior Center property for potential affordable housing and senior center joint project.

WORKFORCE HOUSING GRANT AWARDS


Use of Economic Development Funds to provide grant awards to affordable workforce housing projects in the community.

SKAGIT SHERIFF DRUG TASK FORCE

Continued support of the Skagit County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force.

REOPENING OF YUDWASTA PARK

Acquisition and development of new acreage for Yudwasta Park, reopening in Spring 2026.



COUNTY BUDGET TRANSPARENCY

Increase financial transparency by launching Euna OpenBook website to display County budget as well as actual revenues and expenditures online.

NEW WEBSITE


Launch of new website in 2026 to improve customer service and ensure our website has software support for continued operation.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TRAINING

Broad emergency management and response training to county employees and partner agencies to ensure we are able to effectively respond together.

CULVERT BARRIER REPLACEMENT

Continued replacement of culvert barriers with fish passable structures throughout the county.









HB 2015 PUBLIC SAFETY TAX

- New 0.1% public safety sales tax adopted Nov. 10th and will begin collection on April 1, 2026.
- Funding will be used primarily for Sheriff's Office investigation detectives, park ranger, and expansion of crisis response services countywide.
