The Skagit County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday, March 18, 1997, with Commissioners Harvey Wolden, Robert Hart and Ted W. Anderson present.

PUBLIC HEARING - CONSIDERATION OF LEASE OF COUNTY BUILDING IN MARBLEMOUNT.

Chairman Harvey Wolden opened the Public Hearing.

Roger Howard, Facilities Manager, presented information in regard to the County Building referenced above, reporting that the County had received an application from the Western Washington Resource Council (WWRC) inquiring about the lease of the building located in Marblemount near the County shop.

Theresa Deschene, Chairperson of the WWRC and resident of Marblemount, reviewed the appreciated past use of the building by WWRC, mentioning that the fulfillment of this request to lease the County building will enable the continuation of addressing the many of the needs of the community. Ms. Deschene reported that they have operated under a grant from the State of Washington and that the provision of this building will be listed as an in-kind service provided by Skagit County. Ms. Deschene reiterated the request for the lease of the building for a period of 10 years at the rate of \$1.00 per year with a standard 30-day notice by either party to terminate the agreement.

Commissioner Anderson thanked Ms. Deschene for all her years of assistance to this organization and for the time, dedication and commitment she has given to the community.

Dave Fleming, Risk Manager, inquired about the insurance that is carried by WWRC and Ms. Deschene stated that there is full liability and also insurance on the belongings in the building. Ms. Deschene also mentioned that the State has authorized some of the funds be used for improvements to the building and the Board asked that any proposed improvements be discussed with Mr. Howard prior to implementation.

Commissioner Hart made a motion to close the Public Hearing. Commissioner Anderson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Commissioner Anderson made a motion to approve the lease as presented. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING – COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT REGARDING BLANCHARD-EDISON WASTEWATER FACILITIES.

Chairman Wolden opened the Public Hearing.

Paul Schissler, Grant Facilitator, mentioned that the County would like to request an addendum to the current Community Development Block Grant for the Blanchard-Edison Wastewater Facilities due to some project changes in circumstances and several factors outside the County's control. Mr. Schissler reported that this amendment would extend the date for completion to December 31, 1997.

Mr., Schissler discussed the fact that several questions arose during implementation of the project in Blanchard in regard to two septic systems that were repaired with CDBG funding, one which serves a garage/shop outbuilding and the other serves a residence not currently occupied or habitable. After much research, it was determined that these two properties were appropriately funded.

Mr. Schissler also discussed four households in Blanchard that are waiting to be repaired. Mr. Schissler reported that these households qualified as low-to-moderate-income (LMI) households and contractor bids were received in 1996. The selected contractor will still honor its 1996 bid, however it will be necessary to add \$500 for a pump to comply with County code. Mr. Schissler noted the four households and amounts as Hart/Thelen - \$5,243.20, Jackson - \$10,741, MacMurchie - \$4,500, and Ramirez - \$8,477.20, stating that these amounts include the \$500. Mr. Schissler stated that this will authorization for staff to arrange for the contract (AAA Mechanical Contractors, Inc.) to repair the septic systems of the noted four households will require action by the Board on that set of contracts.

Mr. Schissler continued by reporting the situation in Edison relating to non-eligibility of cost of improvements not located on LMI private homeowner property. Mr. Schissler reported that if we can show that off-site expenses were eligible, the LMI owner-occupied properties will be eligible for CDBG assistance with their assessments.

Lynn Lennox, Bow-Edison, discussed the four households that are currently waiting for septic system repair and discussed the amounts as presented by Mr. Schissler. Ms. Lennox mentioned that the MacMurchie household repair is currently in discussion, as Mr. MacMurchie is requesting \$14,500 for repair in order for the system to be run to his shop. It was discussed as to whether this was a pre-existing failing system out to his shop building. A discussion ensued in this regard.

Commissioner Anderson asked if there was this type of funding available to allow Mr. MacMurchie the option and it was determined that there was not funding to provide for these types of options. Mr. Schissler stated that after review of the files, he recommends that the \$4,500 total for the MacMurchie repair as it appears the shop building does not have an existing wastewater system and we are focusing on existing wastewater systems that are in need of repair.

The Board concurred that the taxpayers should not be supporting options of this nature and the lowest bids should be the ones considered.

Mr. Schissler stated that there is a grievance process in place if anyone should wish to appeal the decision.

Commissioner Hart made a motion to close the Public Hearing. Commissioner Anderson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Commissioner Hart made a motion to authorize the request for amendment to the CDBG contract extending the contract through request December 31, 1997. Commissioner Hart continued the motion to include the clarification of the eligibility of the two properties described as Blanchard properties that have been found to have met the CDBG contract criteria. Commissioner Anderson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Commissioner Hart also made a motion to authorize staff to arrange for AAA Mechanical Contractors, Inc. to repair the septic systems of the following low-to-moderate- income households at a cost not to exceed the amounts shown:

Hart/Thelen -	\$ 5,243.20
Jackson -	\$10,741.00
MacMurchie -	\$ 4,500.00
Ramirez -	\$ 8,477.20

Commissioner Anderson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

MISCELLANEOUS.

1.

Staff presented the closing agreement and escrow instructions in regard to the property currently owned by Burlington-Edison School District which is being purchased by the Skagit County Clean Water District for the drainfield adjacent to the new Edison Elementary School. Commissioner Hart made a motion to approve the Closing Agreement as presented. Commissioner Anderson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. **(Contract No. 03418).**

Staff presented a Resolution for Approval of Sick Leave Transfer for Christie Hilton, an employee of the Skagit County Juvenile Probation Department since 1991. The conditions regarding the transfer of sick leave are as outlined in the Resolution as presented. Commissioner Hart made a motion to approve the Resolution. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. **(Resolution No. 16482).**

PRESENTATION – SKAGIT COUNTY CRITICAL INCIDENT STRESS DEBRIEFING TEAM.

Chairman Wolden opened this portion of the agenda expressing thanks for this team coming today and acknowledged the great service this team provides during a stressful event.

Tom Sheahan, Emergency Management Services, introduced Deb Richards and Pastor Mark Johnson, as spokespersons of today's presentation and also mentioned that Dennis Hofstadt, City of Mount Vernon Fire Chief, Bud Powers, Chief of Burlington Police Department, Ed Goodman, Skagit County Sheriff, Tom Richards, Mount Vernon Police Department and mark Watkinson, Emergency Management were all in attendance today.

Pastor Mark Johnson thanked the Board of Commissioners for inviting the team for this presentation. Pastor Johnson presented a 7-minute video illustrating the stress involved with emergency service workers as an introduction to the program.

Pastor Johnson mentioned that classic Critical Incidents in Skagit County might be concerning the highway patrol in a mass casualty traffic accident, fires that cause loss of life, death of a child, suicide, death of a co-worker, any untimely death and stated that even though there are classic critical incidents, any incidents can be classified critical for someone sometime.

Pastor Johnson discussed Stress and the effect of dealing with stress after a critical incident, indicating symptoms could be a change in job performance, anger, sleep disturbances, guilt, anxiety, physical problems, preoccupation with drinking, emphasizing that critical incident stress produces many issues for individuals to deal with.

Debriefing was also discussed and Pastor Johnson stated that a debriefing process is now available emphasizing that this is not counseling or therapy, but merely a process of getting emergency service workers together to talk about the stress they have endured.

Deb Richards reported on the background and development of the debriefing team. Ms. Richards mentioned that the debriefing team became active in 1992 and that they have done over 70 debriefings, with 15 or 16 members, including law enforcement, health care providers, and mental health professionals. The team in Skagit County is recognized on the state level and also nationally. Ms. Richards also discussed the debriefing team duties.

Pastor Johnson also discussed certain scenarios and stated that debriefing is a formal process which takes place 24 – 72 hours after the incident. Pastor Johnson reviewed a traffic accident that took place involving the fatalities of a mother and her two children. Pastor Johnson stated that this involved many emergency teams and Interstate was closed for many hours and that it cumulated with the debriefing team being called out after the incident. Pastor Johnson stated that all emergency personnel involved at the incident scene are invited to attend the debriefing. Pastor Johnson discussed the strength that is gained from listening to others who have experienced similar stress from the incident. Pastor Johnson emphasized that this debriefing process is not a critique, but an opportunity for debriefing. The public or the press is not invited as these debriefings involve confidential information

Defusings are a little different from debriefings and are done from 2-4 hours after the incident to talk about the incident and give those emergency service providers involved the immediate opportunity to talk about the stress they are experiencing and to educate them that what they are feeling is normal. This education also includes what physical signs of stress they might notice and to inform them of the debriefing process that will follow. Also discussed were the one-to-one contacts that are available following an incident.

Pastor Johnson reiterated that they are not counselors, but peers providing support and education in helping to deal with the incident.

Commissioner Anderson discussed the time frame and inquired about long term effects. Pastor Johnson stated that they often debrief again several weeks later if the need is there.

Chairman Wolden stated his support of this group and discussed a particular incident where this team brought closure to an incident that had occurred eight years prior to a recent incident that had brought this prior incident to the surface.

Ms. Richards stressed that the team is comprised of all volunteers and there are no paid positions and that there is an extensive training program that all members attend to keep the team educated. Ms. Richards mentioned that they would like to provide further pre-education for every emergency service agency in the County so that all agencies know how to access the team and what the team is about.

Pastor Johnson stated that the debriefing team gets together to meet after they have provided debriefing services to critique the debriefing that just took place. Pastor Johnson also mentioned that they have monthly meetings to keep in contact with each other.

Sheriff Goodman discussed his involvement during various situations with the debriefing team and commended the team on their excellent service and publicly thanked the team for their irreplaceable service.

Mark Watkinson, Emergency Management, discussed the role of the Emergency Management Council, in regard to the development of this team and mentioned that the council contributes \$2,000 per year, the team depending on donations for the rest of the funding. Mr. Watkinson thanked the team for the service provided by the team.

Mr. Sheahan recognized Mike Barsness, who was not present today, as he was instrumental in developing this team, and also mentioned the volunteer fire chiefs and others who are instrumental players of the team, who are not in attendance today.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD.

Randy Good, Sedro Woolley, discussed issues involving the rails to trails issues in Skagit County, and stated Citizens Against Rails to Trails stance on the topic.

Jim Helliard, resident of Lake Cavanaugh, presented material to the Board stating opposition to the proposed shooting range in the Lake Cavanaugh area.
