**CONSENT AGENDA
MISCELLANEOUS**

The Skagit County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, March 3, 1999, with Commissioners Ted W. Anderson, Harvey Wolden, and Robert Hart present.

BOARD OF HEALTH – Peter Browning, Director.

1. Public Hearing – Proposed Changes in the Health Department Fee Schedule.

Mr. Browning reviewed the proposed changes in the Health Department Fee Schedule.

There being no public comment forthcoming, Commissioner Wolden moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion, which passed with a unanimous vote.

Commissioner Hart moved to approve the fee schedule as presented by the Health Department. Commissioner Wolden seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. **(Resolution to be provided by Staff)**

2. Child Death Review Report.

Linda Ehrlich, Public Health Nurse, spoke regarding the child death review report. Eleven deaths were reviewed, and she detailed the specifics of the causes of the deaths of these children. Over the half the deaths reviewed were considered to be preventable, and in some instances community resources were not adequately utilized. She addressed three areas where action could be taken. The first area was driving fatalities, and the inexperience of teen drivers in this regard. She spoke regarding a graduated license including increased hours

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driving in daylight, driving with supervision without other teens in the car. She stated that 24 states now have graduated license requirements.

The second cause of death is Perinatal period, which is 6 weeks before birth and four weeks after. She spoke to the affects of the abuse of drugs and smoking.

The third area of concern is Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Ms. Ehrlich reported that nationwide SIDS has been reduced by parents or caregivers putting the babies to bed on their backs. She stated that smoking is attributable to approximately 50% of SIDS deaths.

3. Health Department Lab Update.

Cherry Fox, Water Lab Supervisor, reviewed the specific activities of the water lab using a Powerpoint presentation.

4. Discussion – Developmental Screening

Donna Gustin, Special Health Nurse, spoke regarding Developmental Screening and its value as an integral part of the public health nurse program in the community. She stated that the value is in early identification of developmental delays and educational tools for growth and development. Ms. Gustin indicated that there is increased opportunity for Public Health Nurses to see children and interact with them, and thereby perform informal developmental screening. Formal screening tools can also be utilized. She reviewed an 8 month questionnaire which is pertinent in this regard, the Ages and Stages Questionnaire, which the Board was provided with a copy.

5. Public Health Week and National Infant Immunization Week Request.

Linda Speck, Immunization Clinic Nurse, reported that April has two significant opportunities for celebration and education. She stated that Public Health Week will occur April 4 – 10, and National Infant Immunization Week will be held during the week of April 17 – 24. Ms. Speck requested that the Health Department be authorized to give free immunizations on April 8 as part of those events.

After some discussion about the positive aspects of this program, the Board approved Ms. Speck's request that free immunizations be given on April 8.

6. Discussion – Teen Week.

Jennifer Sass, Public Health Nurse, reported on Teen Week

Ms. Sass advised that the Teen Health Report was released last week. She reviewed the report with the Board. The Department works with parents, children, and the community at large on these teen issues. There is a lot of information about teen pregnancy in the report that has attempted to place within the broader aspect of teen health. Ms. Sass stated that one issue was access to health care, noting that about 90,000 children within the State of Washington do not have health care at all.

7. Miscellaneous.

Peter Browning, Director, reported.

- a) Mr. Browning acknowledged the work of Department Staff in organizing the medical records of the Health Department in the last two years. The department is now in compliance with state requirements.

- b) The Dental Van work has been outstanding. Kim Van Epps has put together a dental van program that other counties are looking at, because it works so well. Mr. Browning stated that there is a strong sense of community support in Skagit County that has helped make the dental van program so successful.

Commissioner Anderson indicated that he has heard nothing but positive feedback on the van.

Mr. Browning said there is a lot of strong dental support in the community from dentists, as well as contributions from businesses and organizations.

Commissioner Wolden said it is important that there is stable funding for the van as it is an excellent program.

FACILITIES PROJECTS UPDATE.

Roger Howard, Director, Facilities Management, reported.

- 1) Settlement has been reached with the contractor on the Courthouse foundation project. The project is completed and accepted and no more claims will be submitted.

Commissioner Hart motioned to approve for signature Change Order No. 2 for final settlement with the Hartford Contract, Inc. in the amount of \$12,000. Commissioner Wolden seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. **(Contract No. 03172)**

- 2) Mr. Howard presented the following document regarding the SKAT building for the Board consideration:

Commissioner Wolden motioned that an easement be approved for signature for water pipeline access by PUD to the new SKAT building. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. **(Contract No. 04287)**

- 3) Mr. Howard talked about the County's overall parking policies. The contractor who has provided the towing service has withdrawn from providing that service, although no cars have been towed for some time. He described some of the parking problems to the Board. There was discussion about some possible solutions to these ongoing problems. The Commissioners suggested that the County contract with a local towing company to provide towing service when needed.
- 4) Mr. Howard reported that he has been working with Paul Schissler, County Grant Writer, on the East County Family Resource Center.
- 5) Mr. Howard advised that he will be meeting with a contractor for the E-911 Communications Center to settle some remaining payment issues. He will provide an update to the Board after that meeting.
- 6) Mr. Howard met with department heads and staff last week regarding the remodel of the Courthouse.
- 7) Mr. Howard reported that he is preparing a schematic plan for a Parks and Recreation building at the Burlington Shop area.

PRESENTATION OF THE 1998 FIXED ASSET INVENTORY.

This item was delayed until a later date.

BID OPENING – ONE NEW LATEST MODEL FOUR-WHEEL DRIVE UTILITY TRACTOR LOADER WITH BUCKET.

Charlie Sisson, ER&R Supervisor, advised that one bid had been received as follows:

The bid was for one 1999 John Deere Tractor at a price of \$33,871.71. They also included an alternate proposal for a 1997 John Deere Tractor at the price of \$30,065.72.

Mr. Sisson advised that this bid would be reviewed thoroughly and a bid award recommendation would be forthcoming within the next few weeks.

21. Personal Services Agreement with Charles Britt, M.A., to provide individual and/or family therapy for the period January 1, 1999 through July 30, 1999, for maximum compensation of \$10,000. **(Contract No. 04302)**

PARKS & RECREATION:

22. Personal Services Agreement with labor Ready #109 to provide temporary labor services on demand including park, grounds and facility maintenance activities, carpentry, plumbing, masonry, painting, electrical, tool/equipment operation, etc., for the period September 1, 1998 through December 31, 1998. Contractor will be compensated at a rate between \$9.96/hour and \$15.04/hour dependent upon the duties performed. **(Contract No. 04303)**

PERSONNEL:

23. Amendment No. 4 to Group Dental Program No. 703 with Washington Dental Service, extending the term of the contract through December 31, 1999. Per Stephanie Wood, this amendment commits the County as follows: 1) Requires that we sign contract documents within 30 days of receiving them or WDS will not be responsible for any errors in claim processing; 2) Adds language in 4 areas in our dental booklet that suggests that employees get pre-authorization for certain dental procedures; and, 3) increases the dental administration fee from \$5.30 per hour to \$5.70 per hour, which is an appropriate increase according to the County's insurance consultant. **(Contract No. 03017)**

MISCELLANEOUS.

1. Vouchers audited and certified by the auditing officer as required by R.C.W. 42.24.080, and those expense reimbursement claims certified as required by R.C.W. 42.24.090, have been recorded on a listing which has been made available to the Board.

As of this date, March 3, 1999, the Board, by a majority vote, did approve for payment those vouchers included in the above-mentioned list and further described as follows:

2. Staff presented three resolutions on behalf of the Skagit County Fair to establish revolving funds for various activities at the fairgrounds this Spring and Summer. Commissioner Wolden moved to approve the Resolution as presented, and Commissioner Hart seconded the motion. The motion passed with a unanimous vote, and the details of these resolutions are as follows:
 - a) \$35,000 for the Skagit County Fair to be held during the months of August and September, 1999 (**Resolution No. 17342**);
 - b) \$1,000 for the Skagit County Kid's Spring Fair to be active for 30 calendar days from April 26, 1999 through may 26, 1999 (**Resolution No. 17343**); and,
 - c) \$500 for the Skagit County Sports & Outdoor Show to remain active for a duration of thirty calendar days from March 19, 1999 to April 19, 1999 (**Resolution No. 17344**)
3. On behalf of the Planning & Permit Center, Staff presented for the Board's consideration an Ordinance to Adopt the City of Mount Vernon Development Standards within the urban Growth Area. Staff advised that this matter had been considered by the Board in December, and that the Ordinance before them simply memorializes the previous action of the Board. Commissioner Wolden moved to approve the Ordinance as presented. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously. (**Ordinance No. 17345**)
4. Staff presented on behalf of the Planning & Permit Center a Clearance and Relocation Contract regarding the County's purchase of private property utilizing Hazard Mitigation Grant funding. This agreement is with Wayne McCann for property located at 4844 (49972) Sauk Store road, and is for the not-to-exceed amount of \$42,904.40. Commissioner Wolden moved to approve the Contract as presented, and Commissioner Hart seconded the motion. The motion passed with a unanimous vote. (**Contract No. 04305**)

ADJOURNMENT.

Chairman Anderson made a motion to adjourn the proceedings. Commissioner Wolden seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

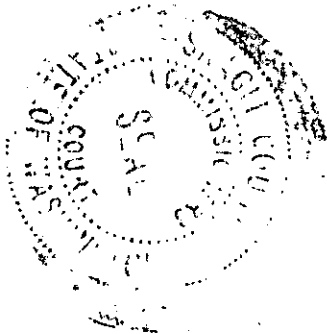
