The Skagit County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday, September 14, 1999, with Commissioners Harvey Wolden and Robert Hart present. Commissioner Ted W. Anderson's absence was excused.

BOARD OF HEALTH – Peter Browning, Director.

1. Introduction of Welcome Baby Coordinator.

Meredith Baker, Welcome Baby Coordinator, gave a brief history of the Welcome Baby program, explaining that this is a parent education and support program. She reviewed the goals and aims of the program.

2. Report on Meningococcal Disease in Skagit County.

Maryl Skjei, Public Health Nurse, reviewed Meningococcal Disease in Skagit County, which is caused by a bacteria, is extremely contagious and can cause fatalities. She stated that 25% of the population carry the disease. She reviewed the symptoms of the disease. She stated that in Skagit County the disease occurs year round and occurs in children and young adults. There are 10-12 cases in Skagit County per year, and this year there have been 7 reported cases. Incubation time is 3-4 days from infection to onset of disease, and is extremely infectious. Ms. Skjei stated that this disease must be mandatorily reported. She explained the roles of the Health Department in educating the public about this disease.

3. Report on E-Coli in Washington State and Skagit County.

Corinne Story, Health Department Staff, spoke regarding education efforts regarding E-Coli in Skagit County. She discussed three recent outbreaks within the United States. Ms. Story reviewed the categories of E-Coli, it's

sources, how it is spread, symptomology, characteristics of the bacteria, and the history of the identification of this bacteria as a pathogen.

Ms. Story reviewed the ways to prevent E-Coli including cooking meat thoroughly, good hygienic practices, food safety at the retail level, and consumer responsibility.

She reviewed the Health Department's Role in the prevention of E-Coli outbreaks, including retail establishments, temporary food inspections, establishment of hand wash stations at the County Fair, oversight of public water systems, and epidemiology.

4. Men's Health, Sports and Hobbies Expo.

Peter Browning, Director, reviewed the activities scheduled for the 1999 Men's Health, Sports & Hobbies Expo at the Burlington-Edison High School on Saturday, September 18th.

5. Report on Supervisors' Retreat.

Mr. Browning reviewed the State's Minimum Standards for Public Health jurisdictions, noting that Skagit County in most cases is doing better than expected and is working in the right direction. This is an effort to make sure local health jurisdictions are focusing on the right issues.

6. Miscellaneous.

There were no miscellaneous items for discussion.

PARKS PROJECTS UPDATE.

This agenda item was cancelled.

FACILITIES PROJECTS UPDATE.

Roger Howard, Facilities Director, discussed the following:

1. Leasing of the Bayview Shop and Marblemount Road Shop, noting that it would be necessary to call for a public hearing to gather testimony regarding the leasing of these two facilities.
2. Mr. Howard asked the Board to consider requesting letters of interest and statements of qualifications regarding architectural services for the design and preparation of construction bid documents for the Search and Rescue and Red Cross building adjacent to the new E911 Center in Mount Vernon. Commissioner Wolden moved to approve request for letters of qualification as explained by Mr. Howard. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hart and passed with a unanimous vote. **(Resolution No. 17567)**
3. Mr. Howard reviewed the drawings of the proposed re-location of the County Clerk's Office on the First Floor of the Courthouse.
4. Mr. Howard discussed with the Board the City of Mount Vernon road project for Kincaid and Third Streets, which will impact the County's parking lots. The Board suggested that perhaps County's Horseshoe shaped parking lot could be resurfaced at the same time.
5. He advised that next week he's meeting with the Parks Department to discuss the Fairgrounds Master Plan.
6. Mr. Howard reported that the underground storage tank and fueling station project is complete.

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7. Mr. Howard reviewed the installation of the Emergency Generator, and the County's position that no further time extensions will be granted.
8. Mr. Howard stated that Jim Barmore of the Museum had requested improvements to the Bay View Shop building consisting of additional insulation, heat, lighting, restroom improvements, and water and electricity hook-ups. Mr. Howard stated that such improvements would cost in excess of \$50,000, and that details could be discussed at the public hearing to be held regarding the lease of this property.

DISCUSSION WITH THE PARKS ADVISORY BOARD.

John Semrau, Parks Advisory Board, thanked the Board for their generosity and support over past years. He briefly introduced the other members of the Parks Advisory Board who were in attendance.

Mr. Semrau indicated that there are three things to be addressed for today's agenda. The first is the Parks Department Budget. Second is Plans for the Parks Board for Year 2000, with input from the Board; and Third, Board's Direction to the Parks Board to assist them in becoming more effective and viable.

Mr. Semrau stated that the Parks Advisory Board (PAB) has reviewed the Parks Department budget, and felt it was very conservative as usual, but that it addresses the basic needs of the Department. He indicated that the PAB feels there is a need to look at growth issues, and towards the use of Real Estate Excise Tax (REET) money for funding much of the work that needs to be accomplished. Such additional requests from the Parks Department include:

1. Clear Lake Park – \$45,750 for replacement of slides, replacement of the concession stand, replacement of the bottom screen to cut down on weed growth, and installation of a recirculation system.
2. Skagit Playfields – requested additional \$50,000 for light replacement, portable fencing, storage facility, and walking path replacement.
3. Marketing – money for a quarterly brochure totaling \$12,000. Mr. Semrau stated that it is the opinion of the PAB that the Count needs to establish a better ownership and awareness of what programs and activities are available. He stated that the PAB thinks it is time to do something a little more formal on a regular basis. A discussion ensued on the development of brochures and flyers.
4. General Maintenance – Mr. Semrau explained that the PAB feels it is time to begin to add to the budget an item for annual replacement of portions of aging facilities for such things as benches, tables, grills, a possible playground at Howard Miller Steelhead Park, and additional tools and equipment. The Department has requested \$75,450 in this regard.

Mr. Semrau stated that the three percent cap requested by the Board makes it very difficult to expand the activities of the Department, and that is why these additional budget requests have been made. He noted that an additional part-time maintenance position had been requested. Further, it is expected that an additional \$70,000 to \$100,000 will be necessary to cover trail systems maintenance and necessary operating supplies, tools and equipment.

Mr. Semrau next discussed direction for the Parks Board for the upcoming year, which include the following topics:

1. Foundation Development and Alternate Funding – Mr. Semrau stated that the PAB had decided to take no further action on this item until they could involve the new Parks Director in the

process, but that this needs to be finalized by the end of October. Commissioner Hart commented about coordinating such efforts with the existing Skagit Foundation.

2. Capital Improvement Plan – Mr. Semrau indicated that the PAB was hoping to review the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) at this meeting, but they will be reviewing the CIP at the next meeting of the PAB from the standpoint of goals associated with the Comprehensive Plan. He spoke regarding the relation of the CIP to long-term issues with citizens groups in conjunction with the Northern State Recreation Area.

A discussion ensued on partnerships with private individuals and entities to fund projects. The issue of long-term funding for maintenance and operation of such projects was also discussed.

3. Departmental Review – Mr. Semrau stated that it has been 2 or 3 years since the different aspects of the Parks Department has been reviewed by the PAB, including various fee policies.
4. Marketing – hoping to solicit more public input regarding the Parks Board activities, and to perhaps concentrate on a specific topic for each meeting.

Mr. Semrau asked the Board for input on what the Board expects from the Parks Advisory Board, indicating that most of the PAB activities are a result of direction from the Parks Director. He indicated that this is a chance for the Board to provide input to the PAB.

Commissioner Wolden stated that the emphasis of the PAB should be in putting energy behind projects. He stated that he considers the PAB the “eyes and ears” of the Commissioners. He encouraged the PAB to bring items to the Board for discussion in a timely manner.

Commissioner Hart concurred with Commissioner Wolden and indicated that the PAB has better contact with the public on what the public wants in their Parks and Recreation Department. He stated that the bottom line is that the Board needs feedback.

Commissioner Wolden spoke to the unprecedented use of real estate excise tax funds for school facilities, and the need for the PAB to bring forward projects of interest outside of the schools for use of real estate excise tax funds.

Mr. Semrau assured the Board that the PAB has looked at where the real estate excise tax money has gone, and intends to keep coming forward with worthy projects.

Commissioner Hart thanked the PAB for their contribution to the County Parks & Recreation Department, noting that several people on the Board have served for quite some period of time. He urged the PAB to work closely with the new Parks Director and current staff to build a long-term relationship.

Mr. Semrau thanked the Board for being responsive to the PAB.

BID OPENING – PROCUREMENT OF MAINTENANCE MATERIALS.

Charlie Sisson, ER&R Coordinator, reviewed that this opening merely establishes an eligibility list of materials and prices for use by employees when they need a particular item. He proceeded to open the proposals that had been received.

DISCUSSION – LAND DATABASE CONSORTIUM.

Commissioner Anderson was present from this portion of the proceedings on.

Rich Doenges, Farmland Legacy Program, gave a brief overview of combined to work smarter. He reviewed the efforts in land protection by Skagit County partnering with Land Trust, Skagitonians to Preserve Farmland, Fisheries Enhancement Group among others. The Skagit Conservation Database Consortium (SCDC) was established in 1998 to collect and analyze environmental data in a geographic information system to aid in the conservation of natural resources within the Skagit River watershed. Mr. Doenges stated that, in this regard, this combined effort has received a grant from the Hewlett Packard Foundation to assist in the coordination of creating a land database of acquired properties that can be shared among the various entities. He spoke regarding the link to the County's GIS/Mapping Department, and the resultant illustrations that can aid in showing habitat restorations and other projects. Mr. Doenges stated that the group has received approximately \$36,000 in pledges to date, and was asking the Board for an additional \$56,000 over three years to finish the work of the database consortium.

Mr. Doenges stated that most of the money is going toward a part-time project coordinator overseeing the work to create the database. He indicated that the first year costs would be \$36,000, followed by projected expenditures of \$27,000 and \$28,000 for the next two years thereafter. He detailed the support from local groups which totals nearly \$36,000. These include the County Public Works Department, which has pledged \$12,000, the Skagit Conservation District which has pledged \$4,000 and office support, Nature Conservancy pledge of \$3,000, Skagit Land Trust pledge of \$1,000, PRISM pledge of \$1,200, and Skagit County Mapping Department pledge of \$700. He stated that this leaves a gap of approximately \$13,300 for the first year.

Josh Greenberg, Ph.D Candidate at the University of Washington, reviewed the specifics of how the project will run, including the flow of information from the County to the Database Consortium. This allows organizations to have access to the data that the County is in possession of. Mr. Greenberg reviewed an example of the proposed Memorandum of Understanding and protections for the sharing of data. He reviewed the particulars of the information that would be available and the results of sample data. Mr. Greenberg emphasized that the strength of the proposal is that different groups can use a unified database.

Geoff Almvig, GIS/Mapping, stated that it has become obvious over the past two years that there is a necessity to consolidate efforts in this area. He spoke to the benefits of sharing information. Mr. Almvig stated that County Mapping will provide access to provide expertise, equipment, and media for the map output. He stated that he and his department would be there primarily for technical support and to provide security for the data.

Commissioner Hart asked about other state and federal agencies that could be included in this system and could benefit from the database. Mr. Doenges indicated that interest has been expressed by the US Forest Service, Department of Natural Resources, and Seattle City Light.

Commissioner Hart questioned the funding being proposed, asking where the \$70,000 asked of the County would come from individual departmental budgets, or whether it was intended to come from the General Fund. Mr. Doenges stated that he envisioned the funds coming from the Mapping Department.

Chairman Anderson stated that everyone likes to preserve the rural area, and that there are more and more issues from different focus groups. He asked how the taxpayers in general would benefit from this database, and if the general public would have access to the database. He emphasized the need to understand the benefit to the taxpayers at large.

Mr. Doenges replied that the information would be accessible at the Conservation District Office to anyone wanting to view the information.

Chairman Anderson clarified that if taxpayer dollars are going to be dedicated, it is necessary to determine the benefit. He expressed concern with the acquisition of land and the removal of such properties from the tax rolls.

Mr. Doenges agreed that taking property off of the tax rolls is a concern, but that this database is value-neutral, and can help determine where available lands are. It merely provides data.

Commissioner Wolden commented that when the Growth Management Act was passed, one of the first things that should have been done was a complete inventory of all lands, rather than hypothetical applications.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION – BAYVIEW RIDGE URBAN GROWTH AREA INTERIM ORDINANCE.

Gary Christensen, Assistant Director, reviewed the public hearing and deliberations recently held regarding this proposed interim ordinance. He stated that Staff has now prepared an interim ordinance for the Board's consideration and signature. He briefly summarized the Ordinance itself, reviewing particulars.

A discussion ensued regarding road standards, and Mr. Christensen indicated that the City of Burlington road standards would prevail, but that the County Planning Director can exempt the need for curbs, and gutters.

Commissioner Wolden stated that he is committed to direct distressed county funds to this area for curbs, gutters and sidewalks.

Mr. Christensen stated that as a part of the six-year TIP, the Board could direct road projects in this area.

Chairman Anderson indicated that it appears that the intention of the distressed county fund can be used for infrastructure such as roads.

A discussion ensued on the necessity for a subarea plan for the area, and the standards for roads to be constructed.

Commissioner Wolden moved for approval of an Interim Ordinance Establishing an Interim Urban Growth Area for Bayview Ridge and Establishing Use Restrictions and Requirements for Public Facilities and Services and a Commitment to Complete a Subarea Plan. Commissioner Hart seconded the motion, which passed with a unanimous vote. **(Ordinance No. 17568)**

MISCELLANEOUS.

1. Staff presented an Interim Ordinance of the County of Skagit, State of Washington Renewing Interim ordinance No. 17419, "Personal Wireless Service Facilities." The Board had previously voted to approve this Interim Ordinance at a public hearing held on Monday, September 13. The Board signed the Interim Ordinance as presented. **(Ordinance No. 17569)**
2. Vouchers audited and certified by the auditing officer as required by R.C.W. 42.24.080, and those expense reimbursement claims certified as required by R.C.W. 42.24.090, have been recorded on a listing, which has been made available to the Board.

As of this date, September 14, 1999, the Board, by a majority vote, did approve for payment those vouchers included in the above-mentioned list and further described as follows:

Warrants numbered 52798 through 53074 from Clearing Fund 696, in the total dollar amount of \$588,381.43 (Transmittal No. C-68-99).

ADJOURNMENT.

Chairman Anderson made a motion to adjourn the proceedings. Commissioner Wolden seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
