The Skagit County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, July 2, 2001, with Commissioners Ted W. Anderson, Kenneth A. Dahlstedt, and Don Munks all present.

DEPARTMENT HEAD MEETING

Mike Almvig, Director, Information Services, said 2002 budget preparation materials are ready and can be obtained from the Skagit County website. Departments should submit their requests as soon as possible, with requests for computers and printers being received by August 3. Automated system requests are due by July 13. In explaining the importance of receiving requests as early as possible, he described the fact that about 39 projects are being tracked right now, with 40 to 50 in the queue. One request can tie up five engineers.

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Roger Howard, Director, Facilities Management, reported that he is working on bid specifications to repair and resurface the parking lot behind the courthouse. The contractor will install temporary fencing around the sidewalks. Some work will occur at night because of the court schedule and the need for heavy equipment to remove the asphalt.

Commissioner Anderson asked Mr. Howard to explain why this repair is so extensive.

Mr. Howard said the biggest issue is drainage, as the lot does not drain well, with a lot of ponding occurring. All of the drainage systems, catch basins and pipe will be replaced, with utility lines to deal with as well. The electrical power that serves courthouse and annex is fed through this building through conduits under that parking lot.

He added that it is unlikely the project can occur without breaking something. i.e. power, water, etc. He said they would do the best they can.

Peter Browning, Director, Health Department, made a suggestion about copy machines. Since the County is buying copy machines for all of the different departments, it might be feasible down the road to have an area for large copying projects. Projects could be dropped off to be completed on a larger copier, with the idea of keeping more manageable copy machines in each department. Another disadvantage of the present system, at least in the Health Department, is the fact that public health nurses can be tied up doing copying projects, which is not a cost savings.

Mike Almvig added that they have seen a lot of people use equipment wrongly. He wondered how much outsourcing the County is doing now.

Commissioner Anderson suggested that Cori Russell, Tom, and Mike take a look at this. It sounds like it may be a very good idea.

The difficulty for employees to use county restroom facilities was brought up for discussion. Currently, Records Management employs a disabled employee. Cori Russell said the present facilities are very difficult for disabled employees to use. Joanne Angevine agreed, stating that she thought there could be a possibility that the County could be out of compliance with ADA requirements if something isn't done about it.

Commissioner Anderson requested that Roger Howard look into finding a door opener for restrooms. He said a friend told him that the placement of door handles could very well correct some of these problems.

Ms. Angevine expressed appreciation for the fact that this employee was hired. She said she thought the museum and the library could very well use employees with disabilities.

Mr. Browning talked about a success story with a previous employee. Commissioner Anderson was very supportive of this and said he was appreciative of department heads that are willing to participate in hiring disabled employees.

Karen Marshall, Director of the Skagit County Historical Museum in La Conner, introduced herself to everyone. She said that recently about 18 volunteers made up a work party at the Rosario School on Fidalgo Island. She then thanked the Parks and Recreation Department for their help in allowing the Museum to use their truck. She stated that they plan to raise about \$4,000 more dollars to put a roof on the school. She invited everyone to come to the latest exhibit of Darius Kinsey photographs. She added that the WWII exhibit has been postponed until March 2002.

Commissioner Anderson mentioned that a friend of his has the original flag Hitler flew at the Eagles Nest. He thought it would be nice to borrow the flag for that exhibit.

Ms. Marshall said that people in all areas of the county would be working on this exhibit with herself and museum staff.

Lastly, Ms. Marshall mentioned that they are presently working on developing a major fund raising event.

Joanne Angevine, Director, Human Services, asked for clarification of the flood control policy, especially as it is linked to salmon conservation.

Commissioner Munks said that their complaint about making the Chinook an endangered species is the fact that they took only wild salmon. It was reported in the news yesterday that the season has been extended because of record levels of Chinook. He said he thought a lot of this is more political than scientific.

Commissioner Anderson added that for almost every dollar out there now, there would likely be a salmon component. He agreed with Commissioner Munks that this is probably a lot more political than scientific. Skagit County really needs a flood control project and they are looking for a way for that to happen, with the salmon component part of it.

Commissioner Dahlstedt said there are a lot of facets to this project. It is a huge benefit for transportation and if fish is a component, there will be some fish recovery as part of the project. He said the goal of the Commissioners is to make this a success. That is why the hiking and biking trails are important, as the land may be used for hiking and biking. People who don't have an interest in flooding may have an interest in hiking and biking. They are trying to look at creative ways to get the public needs met.

Ms. Angevine was concerned about a possible flooding event.

Commissioner Dahlstedt agreed that at some point the talking has to stop and something needs to get done. He said he is thankful that the three Commissioners are committed to working together.

Tom Karsh talked about moving ammonium nitrate through the County last month. The movers of the material worked out a deal with Dan Cain, Skagit County Fire Marshall, to do smaller portions at a time. It is now on a barge on its way to Alaska.

Commissioner Anderson referred to some articles in the newspaper about the real estate excise tax money. He explained that there are hurdles that have to be overcome with state agencies and others to get some of these projects going. The committee that reviews the applications for sales tax money is broad based and, although their decisions are subjective, they do know that the projects they approve will bring jobs and economic development to Skagit County.

Another recent article had to do with the Northern State Recreation Area. The REET Committee made a unanimous recommendation to support the project. There is no other facility in the State or the County as unique as this property.

He then reviewed some of the projects that have occurred with the help of real estate excise tax funds. For example, the weight room at Concrete High School was expanded and their track was relocated. They partnered for \$150,000 for a new track at Sedro Woolley High School, and \$100,000 for Burlington High School, with a commitment to Mount Vernon to do the same thing. He also mentioned the skateboard parks in Anacortes and Mount Vernon, adding that La Conner will also be getting a skateboard park.

In terms of ball fields, every single one in the County is booked. The playfield they are trying to get for Northern State will benefit every community in the County.

He said that he wanted to talk about this so department heads would understand the perspective of the Commissioners. Things can start in a positive mode, but often end up focusing on the negative, which tends to diminish the value of the programs. He mentioned that Best Self and Best Place have been very beneficial to the County and have brought many things to the community that would not have been affordable.

Commissioner Munks agreed, talking about where the REET funding has been allocated to date. He said that only about 1/8 of that funding has come back to the County.

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Commissioner Dahlstedt said he thought the County has done a good job in setting up this process. Only a few counties have actually done this.

Commissioner Anderson said that everyone does a great job representing the County in the communities, as 99% of the comments he receives are positive. The only problem is that the negative ones are louder. He said that customer service pays dividends.

Mike Almvig said they are seeing a lot of positive comments on the website about Skagit County and where the County is going.

Nancy Brown, Director, Youth & Family Services, suggested that a way for the County to counter some of the press is to come back with accurate information. She asked about a public information officer.

Commissioner Anderson said they are going to talk about this for the budget for 2002, as there does need to be a way to get the County's side of the story out to the public. Televising more meetings would help also.

The meeting adjourned, with the Commissioners thanking everyone for attending.

2) Commissioner Munks motioned to approve a Personal Services Agreement with Cynthia Weed, Preston Gates & Ellis, LLC to advise and counsel Skagit County with respect to the proposed formation of a Public Facilities District by the County and the legal requirements related to such formation. The term of this Agreement shall commence on March 1, 2001 and continue until terminated. Compensation shall be \$290 per hour. Commissioner Dahlstedt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. (Contract #005359)

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

3) Commissioner Munks motioned to approve a contract for Personal Services No. C120-1108 with the Superintendent of Public Instruction, State of Washington and the Skagit County Health Department to conduct health and sanitation evaluations of ten school kitchens being used by the Best SELF summer staff. The Contract shall begin June 15, 2001 and end September 8, 2001. Total compensation shall not exceed \$800. Commissioner Dahlstedt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. (Contract #005360)

HUMAN SERVICES

- 4) Commissioner Munks motioned to approve a County Program Agreement with the Department of Social & Health Services (DSHS) to cover substance abuse treatment services offered in the community. The Agreement shall take effect July 1, 2001 and end on June 30, 2003. Total amount shall be \$1,444,724.00. Commissioner Dahlstedt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. (Contract #5361)
- 5) Commissioner Munks motioned to approve Amendment No. 2 with Skagit Recovery Center, which amends the client hours. Commissioner Dahlstedt seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. (Contract No. 04532)

The landowner is receiving \$45,565.38 for the easement, with approximately one-quarter of this amount to be reimbursed to the County from the NRCS Farmland Protection Program grant. FORMAL ACTION TO COORDINATE WITH PACIFIC LEGAL FOUNDATION

John Moffat reported. A couple of months ago the Commissioners requested information about pending litigation regarding the Endangered Species Act listing of the Chinook salmon. He stated that he

contacted Russell Brooks of the Pacific Legal Foundation about this and found other counties are involved in trying to overturn the Endangered Species Act listing of Chinook salmon. The Commissioners have before them for signature a Memorandum of Understanding for Legal Representation by Pacific Legal Foundation staff attorneys. He explained that there would be no attorney's fees paid by Skagit County and the County would be limited to paying a proportionate share of costs, up to \$500.00, and another \$500.00 if appealed.

Commissioner Munks motioned to approve for signature a Memorandum of Understanding on Legal Representation by Pacific Legal Foundation Staff Attorneys to provide representation in connection with challenging the National Marine Fisheries Service's listing of the Chinook salmon as a protected species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). (Contract #005367)
