The Skagit County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, April 01, 2002 with Commissioner Don Munks, Commissioner Kenneth A. Dahlstedt and Commissioner Ted W. Anderson present.

<u>Presentation by Economic Development Association of Skagit County (EDASC) Regarding Washington</u> <u>Community Economic Revitalization Team (WA-CERT) Grant Funding</u>

Don Wick, Executive Director, Economic Development Association of Skagit County, presented four projects to the board for their review.

- 1) PUD No. 1 of Skagit County for Water System Improvements for Janicki Machine, Sedro Woolley.
- 2) Town of Concrete for Public Water Supply System Planning and Improvements.
- 3) City of Anacortes for cleanup and re-development of the former Anacortes Plywood Mill site.
- 4) Skagit County Parks and Recreation for the Northern State Recreational area for trails, campgrounds, environmental education center, etc.

Mr. Wick will come back before the Board on Monday, April 9 with recommendations.

Presentation – Skagit County Tulip Fly-In

Julie Hubner, organizer of the Skagit County Tulip Fly-In event reported. She stated that she is a pilot and flight instructor and a member of the Skagit Airport Association, which was formed about five years ago. All of the vendors at the airport are members of the association.

This is the fifth year for the fly-in, which is planned for Saturday, April 6 at the Skagit Regional Airport at Bayview from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Last year there were so many planes that they were close to running out of spae to park aircraft. Approximately 2,000 people attended the event. There are a variety of airplanes at the fly-in, including some WWII aircraft and a 247B from the Boeing Flight Museum. The largest of these aircraft would be a TBM Avenger, which they hope they will be there this year. The military has also been invited to the event with a Navy helicopter from Whidbey and an Army Chinook helicopter expected.

The purpose of the fly-in is twofold. When the Skagit Airport Association formed about five years, with all of the vendors at the airport as members, the purpose was to have one group communicating with the port. Another reason for the event is because of the number of airports closing down around the country. Each week in the aviation press more airports are reported to be closing down. The association recognized that as a group they need to be proactive in making sure the public knows what the airport is used for. It is an essential public facility.

Features for the event this year are the Young Eagles Program, with the Experimental Aircraft Association. Your people are invited to attend the fly-in and sign up for a free flight in June.

Businesses around the airport will have their doors open for tours during the fly-in. Regarding a 100-year flood or a major disaster, Ms. Hubner said she has been talking to Tom Sheahan, Director of Emergency Management, about the importance of the airport if such a disaster should occur.

Ms. Hubner concluded her comments by thanking the community and the various agencies representing the community for their support for the fly-in.

Update – Concrete High School Track Project

Marie Phillips, Superintendent, Concrete School District, presented an update on the Concrete High School Track Project. Many improvements have been made since last meeting with the commissioners.

She provided some background, explaining that Concrete is the only school district in the area without an all weather track. She thanked the Commissioners for the funds pledged by the county for the update of their track. Seattle City Light has provided equipment and help in getting the work done. The volunteer support has been tremendous, greater than anything she has seen anywhere else.

She then provided an update relative to Phase II of the project, the transformation of the track to an all weather track. Dr. Phillips introduced a number of volunteers who made comments as follows.

Kari Newby, elementary school teacher, former track coach and parent, said that an all weather track would allow for more ability for involvement by the kids in the area. Last year Oak Harbor completed their all weather track and their program doubled in size in terms of student involvement. Track meets are frequently cancelled because of weather and, oftentimes, are never rescheduled.

Rich Bennett, Athletic Director, Concrete High School, said he has been at Concrete High School since last August and has been impressed with the dedication of the community in supporting the students. The field was in poor condition when we started this partnership with the County and now it is in very good condition. The first phase was to put covered bleachers up, which has been accomplished. A problem that continues to exist is the poor drainage of the track. It doesn't drain and pools of water sit there and meets have often been cancelled. An all weather surface would really enhance the ability of kids to practice and participate. The community uses the track extensively. He thanked the board for their support and emphasized the need to complete this last phase of the improvements to the track.

Bill Newby reported. He said he is the pusher, doer, communicator and coordinator. The field is now totally fenced, which has really improved security. There has been lots of help from lots of people. With regard to the irrigation, the pipe that was installed 50 year ago has been replaced. All of the sub-base work will be volunteer, but professional help will be needed for surfacing of the track.

Nancy Faulkner, Business Manager for the district, provided financial background. Relative to the funding provided by the county, they have been very frugal in the way they have managed it. The community contribution continues to be greater than anything else.

Dr. Phillips said that at Concrete High School right now 50% of the students are going out for something. One of the areas under Phase II is the benefit to residents of the county. A variety of people use the track on a regular basis, including senior citizens, young mothers with children, students who work out on the track, etc.

The scope of the proposal in Phase II is to put the gravel down, do the asphalting and then apply the final surface. The estimated cost is \$123,423.00. They are at the point where they need professional engineering assistance and expertise. She said they don't have the kind of money needed and area again coming to the county and asking for assistance. The project has also received support from Seattle City Light, the Lion's Club Booster Club, various schools and private citizens. The Lion's Booster Club has done so much it has been phenomenal.

Gary Moody reported. He said his daughter is a junior at the high school and she runs track. His son graduated last year. It is an embarrassment when other schools come to Concrete to run on their track. It is amazing the kids can do as well as they do with the track versus the tracks at other schools where they participate. He thanked the Board and asked the Commissioners to support them with additional funding to complete the track.

Dr. Phillips concluded the presentation and again thanked the Commissioners for their assistance and asked that they consider the proposal for Phase II of the project.

Commissioner Anderson talked about the track the county did with La Conner and Burlington and noted that a track will also be done with Mount Vernon. The method of doing some of these projects is with the levied ³/₄ percent of real estate excise tax. There is a backlog of these projects and the Commissioners may want to revisit this issue. The County's financial situation is looking pretty bleak for the next year.

Chairman Munks suggested that the group submit a formal proposal for real estate excise tax funding (REEP) to the County right away.

Commissioner Anderson pointed out that the entire baseball complex was built with volunteer labor, which is an unbelievable task.

Commissioner Dahlstedt stated that Northern State has had 60% of the real estate money for the last ten years. He emphasized that every kid in this county is important. The Parks Advisory Board recently expressed their hope that the County would put more money into maximizing the facilities we already have.

Chairman Munks thanked everyone for attending and for their comments.

The term of this Agreement shall commence on January 1, 2002 and continue until December 31, 2004. Compensation shall range from \$15-\$70 per hour, depending on the services being rendered. <u>C20020118</u>
- 17. Re-application for a continuance of funding for the Skagit Title V Delinquency Prevention Program, which would extend the program an additional year, beginning July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003. The program features a three-year strategic plan identifying gaps in local delinquency prevention resources, most notably a lack of truancy services and a need to expand academic support to Latino youth. In response to these resource deficiencies, this proposal funds intervention, case management and professional service delivery to young people experiencing school attendance problems. This program will conclude its first year of service in June. Services are thriving and a comprehensive data-gathering component will demonstrate their effectiveness. The grant reimburses 1 FTE Case Monitor and .13 FTE of a Truancy Intervention Specialist (both current staff). Youth and Family Services are responsible for some cash match, but all of the money is currently contained in the department's professional services budget. No additional funds are necessary and a great majority of the match will be in-kind provided by the community and the department. <u>C20020119</u>

DISCUSSION – TITLE 3 GRANT APPLICATION UPDATE – NORTH CASCADES ENVIRONMENTAL LEARNING CENTER

Kris Molesworthy of the North Cascades Environmental Learning Center provided an update to the Commissioners on the work of the center. She also briefed them on a grant proposal currently before the Resource Advisory Committee.

North Cascades Institute is the preeminent provider of natural history education in the Pacific Northwest. It's mission is to conserve and restore Northwest environments by building an ecologically literate, informed and engaged public. They have also achieved renown nationally for their work. Natural history seminars and classes take place in the field everywhere, serving about 16,000 people per year.

Construction will begin this week on the North Cascades Environmental Learning Center at Diablo Lake. It is a \$14.5 million dollar project and, when completed, will be home to many of their programs. The City of Seattle and the National Park Service are partners in the project. An application for Title 3 monies is currently before the Resource Advisory Committee to assist in funding some of the center's programs.

After some discussion, the Board thanked Ms. Molesworth for her comments.
