#### Welcome

#### • Membership Introduction

Michael Sharp announced and welcomed new PHT member Kenneth Lawson, representing Education, on behalf of the Skagit Valley College.

## Steering Committee Update

#### Recommendation

Debra gave an update from the Steering Committee and shared their recommendation that Maternal & Child Health be our next Indicator project. The Steering Committee believes; there is good traction in the community, new collaborations are taking place with a variety of organizations, this is a true upstream investment, and it encompasses a wide array of other PHT indicators that include: nutrition, chronic disease prevention, oral health, and immunizations.

## Comments/Questions

- ➤ Due to the limits in the K-12 school system, this would be a great asset to prepare kids for school
- East County has a huge need for this kind of a resource and would have a positive impact in the community
- ➤ Being such a large landscape with organizations with established strategic plans, this enables us to ask them where PHT can advocate and match their needs
- > This is truly an "upstream area," we will see the impact years down the road
- Most of our other indicators correlate to Maternal & Child Health, so we can touch on other areas throughout the process
- ➤ The gaps analysis process could take more or less time, depending on community involvement and our ability to assess current efforts

A motion is passed to make Maternal and Child Health the next Trust priority item, The motion was seconded, and the group unanimously approved.

#### • Trust Endorsement

Kristen updated the group about the upcoming Firearm Safety Event on May  $13^{\text{th}}$ . The Steering committee discussed and endorses requesting a \$500 donation from the Trust, which provides an opportunity for increased name recognition.

A motion was passed to provide a \$500 contribution from the Trust for the Firearm Safety Event. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

## Opioid Updates

Kristen shared that we now have an Opioid link on our website which includes the Call to Action and Assessment report. Other work in this area is as follows:

- ✓ Skagit Regional Health is currently reviewing their opioid prescribing practices which includes;, Narcan education & training, appropriate Narcan distribution upon discharge from the ED, and their MAT referrals process.
- ✓ The New Jail will include expanding the current Substance Use Disorder programs to the female population, as well as give Narcan upon release
- ✓ Exploring the distribution of Narcan kits in local schools
- ✓ Community Action is including Narcan-trained staff in their residences

## Announcements & Updates

#### **ACH Toolkit**

Jennifer Johnson gave an update on the current ACH work and 1115 Waiver implementation. The governance of the ACH has undergone some changes including: establishing a Board of Directors comprised of 10-15 executive level persons, as well as a Program Area Workgroup. The Waiver Toolkit has 4 project area requirements and 2 have been chosen thus far: Opioids & Bi-directional Integration of Care. The choosing of the other 2 are still in progress, and workgroups need to be established for all 4. In regards to Tribal representation, that is to be determined. Murray shared that MIN-NS has applied for a Care Coordination grant that would be a good fit for the Bi-directional Integration of Care project. A decision about the funding should be announced in June.

#### Maternal & Child Health Initiatives

Jennifer Sass-Walton talked about 3 upcoming initiatives:

- > Transforming Clinical Practices Initiative
  - Collaboration between DOH, Molina Healthcare, Wa chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics
  - o It is to help providers implement the Patient-Centered-Medical Home Model, learn from successful practices and prepare for value-based payment.
- Strategic Framework for Newborn Initiative
  - o WA State Frontiers of innovation
  - The Newborn Initiative will focus on enhancing local systems of service and supports for families during the prenatal to infancy/toddler period in two selected communities.
- > 5-2-1-0 Initiative
  - Nutrition First of WA
  - 5-2-1-0 is a nationally recognized obesity prevention program with the goal of increasing physical activity and healthy eating for children from birth to 18 through policy and environmental change.

#### **Grant Awards**

Liz shared that Sedro-Woolley and Anacortes are grant recipients for Complete Street Awards. Healthy Communities members, in collaboration with Skagit County Public Health and Cascade Bicycle Club, worked to get these two Skagit cities nominated. The Complete Streets Program is a way of looking at transportation that considers the need of all users. Both Sedro-Woolley and Anacortes have adopted a Complete Streets ordinance and have been implementing policies in a way that demonstrates a strong Complete Streets ethic, which propelled them into the finalist category. Anacortes was awarded \$250,000 and Sedro-Woolley \$125,000 to be used on future Complete Streets project implementation.

## Retreat in May

David asked the group if they'd be interested in participating in Retreat on the normal PHT meeting day May 4th, from 8:30am-2:00pm. The goal is to update all PHT members about changes in their respective services areas and to better prepare for the years ahead. The group agreed, Kristen and David will begin planning.
