ROCKPORT

Mr. And Mrs. Perry Harding, of Sauk, have taken up their residence in the Janson cottage here, coming here after the flood waters of the Sauk and Skagit rivers drove them to spend a day and night in box cars on the Great Northern track. The waters of the Sauk completely covered the track to a depth of several inches, having risen to the greatest height ever known at that place.

Slides on the city of Seattle's railway track in the vicinity of the talc mine and at Portage are causing a great deal of trouble. The trolley car returning from the basketball game with Sedro-Woolley at Newhalem was stalled at Portage from 8 o'clock Sunday morning until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, while railroad crews were shoveling and blasting out the debris, which covered the track to a depth of ten feet.
